

Religious Observances September 2023 – August 2024

The university has a legal obligation to take reasonable measures to accommodate employees and students who request time off for religious observances for which a day of observance is not provided by statute. If you need an accommodation for a religious or spiritual observance, it is important to provide reasonable advance notice of your intended absence.

***Bold indicates religious accommodation advisement.** University community members please consider alternate days when planning significant events.

All Bahá'í, Jewish and Wiccan days start at sunset on the evening prior to the day listed.
