# Curriculum Vitae and Publication History for Kathryn Bridge

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### **CAREER SUMMARY**

My professional life in the worlds of archives and museums has me wearing the hats of archivist, historian and curator, balancing the academic focus of publications with public presentations and exhibitions.

I worked at the BC Archives and Royal BC Museum in different and increasingly more senior positions over my career. In 2015, I stepped away from managerial responsibilities to return to a more active curatorial role and then retired from employment at the RBCM in September 2017. I am now an independent curator and writer.

My career as an archivist stimulated my interest in enabling others to know the stories of individuals and families whose records are held in collections within Canada's many archives. Moving into the museum world more formally years later broadened this opportunity. I continue to bring these stories to others through publication and exhibition, and by encouraging students to use primary sources and to consider public history as a career.

My research centres on archival sources with emphasis on Canadian women's history and art history, children and childhood in nineteenth century western Canada. I have published widely with monographs on pioneering women, Canadian artist Emily Carr, and First Nations; curated major exhibitions about historical British Columbia, Emily Carr, and other artists including, recently, Canadian artist Sophie Pemberton.
