


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Learning Objectives:

This survey course examines ideological snapshots of Asia-Pacific modernity in the aftermath of colonialism, war, ethnic conflict, and migration – in effect, counter-posing longstanding tropes of the nation-state and essentialized culture against textual, intertextual, and extra-textual analyses spanning times past, present, and potential futures.
