PAAS 208 Family, Gender and Sexuality in the Asia-Pacific

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Course description:

In this course, you will examine how family, gender, and sexuality have been constructed in relation to nation-building, colonialism, militarism, capitalism, and biopolitical technologies in the modern and contemporary Asia-Pacific. By looking into various topics including gender inequalities, ideal femininity/motherhood, militarized sexual violence, bodily autonomy, feminist movements, and LGBTQ identity politics in East and Southeast Asian societies, you will *unsettle* the conventional association of "Asian culture" with static Confucian values. Instead, you will be encouraged to articulate how normative ideas of gender roles and identities are (re)produced in negotiation with complex political relations, and how individuals' gendered experiences reveal both their vulnerabilities and resistance potential. A variety of scholarly and literary works, and visual materials will help you navigate crucial questions around family, gender, and sexuality in the Asia-Pacific and beyond.

- Midterm & final exams (essay questions, each exam 20%, total 40%)
