# **Mini-University Summer Camp**

An immersive experience for Indigenous youth

For one week each summer, UVic's classrooms, dorms and outdoor spaces host some younger-than-usual visitors from all over BC and the Northwest Territories. A week full of academic, creative, cultural and social activities provides an immersive opportunity for participants to see for themselves what attending UVic would be like.

Since its inception in 2008, the Mini-U Summer Camp has made a significant impact, with a total of 315 students participating from grades 9–12. Among these participants, 36 students have either attended or are currently enrolled at UVic, demonstrating the program's effectiveness in exposing students to the university experience and contributing to their pursuit of higher education.

The impact that Mini-U has on Indigenous youth is evident in the many smiles you will see throughout this photo book.

This created a safer space for the students to go around and make new connections.
