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COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course introduces students to key concepts and theories in international human rights. The readings focus on ethical and theoretical issues raised by the international human rights law and practices. The assignments and course material are designed to give students a basic understanding of international human rights concepts, legal regimes and institutions, and to enable them to apply the concepts and theoretical frameworks studied to contemporary events and cases. Readings in the final three weeks will focus on concepts and issues related to the human rights of children.

COURSE OBJECTIVE

This course will:

- introduce students to key concepts and issues in theoretical treatments of human rights
- give students a basic understanding of the international legal regimes governing human rights violations
- enable students to identify central theoretical and ethical issues raised by international human rights lawand its enforcement
- improve students' ability to critically engage with academic literature
- improve students' writing skills
- improve students' abilities to relate theoretical arguments to practical examples

TEACHIING METHODOLOGY

This course is taught in a seminar format and will include undergraduate students studying philosophy as well as graduate students from a variety of disciplines. Students will be expected to do the readings in advance and to come to class ready to ask questions and contribute to discussion.

EXPECTED EVALUATION METHODOLOGY

1 page response to readings (x5)

Due by 10 am on Friday of the week in which the readings responded to are assigned

7-9 page paper 35% Must be based around one of the readings from the first half of the course

Annotated Bibliography on topic of 12-15 page paper 12.5% Minimum 4 sources

12-15 page research paper 45% Topic open-ended but must relate to international human rights. Must incorporate a case study chosen by the student. May draw on material from 7-9 page paper but does not have to.
