### **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

The course looks at alternative forms of association for carrying on business (including not-for-profit business activities) with particular emphasis on partnerships and corporations. It briefly looks at agency law and sole proprietorship. It will examine partnerships, limited partnerships, limited liability partnerships and corporations in somewhat more detail. Time permitting it will briefly consider other forms of association that **may** include business trusts, co-operatives, societies (or similar not-for-profit forms of incorporation), unincorporated associations, social enterprise, franchises, and joint ventures.

### **COURSE OBJECTIVES**

Students should be able to:

- 1. Base Knowledge:** Demonstrate an understanding of material covered in the course by answering short, matching, true/false, or multiple-choice questions on a mid-term quiz and/or final exam.
- 2. Application**
  - (i) Identify Issues:** Identify agency, sole proprietorship, partnership, corporate law or other form of association issues in a given fact situation;
  - (ii) Set Out the Law:** State, with supporting statutory and/or case authority, a reasonable view of the law on the issues;
  - (iii) Apply the Law to the Facts:** Apply the law to the facts to give advice as to:
    - (a) the steps that will have to be taken in a transaction; and/or
    - (b) what rights or remedies a particular person may have and what their chances of successfully enforcing those rights and obtaining those remedies would be; and/or
  - (iv) Discuss Policy:** Discuss the reasons for the law, how the policy applies in the given fact situation, and whether the law is appropriate to deal with the given fact situation.
- 3. Policy:** Demonstrate an understanding of the broader social context in which businesses operate as it relates to the social responsibilities of business organizations, the effectiveness of business organizations in their production and/or service activities, and the role of the lawyer in advising business organizations in consideration of this broader social context by **(i)** answering an essay question on an exam; and/or **(ii)** noting the broader social context and/or role of the lawyer in responding to other questions on an exam.

### **TEACHING METHODOLOGIES**

Achievement of the “base knowledge” objective noted above will be based primarily on the readings for the course. **Students will be expected to read through ALL the materials for the course (roughly 630 pages of the *Notes on Business Associations* including roughly 260 pages of statutory materials) (*covering the entire course syllabus*).** The classes will consist of a combination of lecture and problem analysis. Sample problems will be the primary approach to learning the “application” objective noted above.
