OBJECTIVES

This course provides an overview of the theory, practice and context of international criminal justice. Students will learn about the origins of individual criminal responsibility for international crimes; the historical development of international criminal law; the rationales and justifications for international criminal punishment; the definitions and development of the 'core' international crimes; intersection between national and international jurisdiction for the prosecutions of international crimes; the basic practice of various international criminal tribunals; and, alternatives to formal criminal trials. Although this course does not study the substantive definitions of international crimes in-depth, students will become familiar with basic principles of international crimes as well.

In canvassing these issues, the course will focus attention on the colonial dimensions of international criminal law, including an examination of Canada's relationship to Indigenous peoples.

TEACHING METHODOLOGY

This class is taught as a discussion-led, seminar-style course. Class time will be divided between lectures by the instructor, and class presentations and discussions that are led by students. Readings will introduce and explore related issues, and students will direct discussions within the group.

EXPECTED EVALUATION METHODOLOGY

NB – this is preliminary and subject to change

Mandatory:

- 1. Reading Reflections 10%
- 2. Research Exercises 10%
- 3. Presentation (or equivalent) 20%
- 4. Research Project/Paper Proposal 10%
- 5. Research Project/Paper 50%

Students who wish to pursue a Research Project in lieu of Research Paper may only do so with the permission of the instructor.

Students may also satisfy their Major Research Paper (MRP) through this course, but only with the permission of the instructor. Students who pursue an MRP will see their evaluation components change to reflect the added requirements of the MRP.
