Enoch's Modern Echoes

Enoch, a seemingly minor figure in ancient texts, has resurfaced in various contemporary religious imaginaries. I explore how Enoch's narrative, often detached from the original texts, is echoed by modern commentators. It reveals how Enoch has transformed into a symbol of 'exotic capital'—valued for its mysterious nature—mirroring the Enochian corpus' ancient role in filling narrative gaps with speculative lore. This analysis underscores the dynamics of socio-cultural textual transmission and the allure of secrecy among religious groups.

Rebekka King is a Professor at Middle Tennessee State University, specializing in contemporary Christianity. Author of The New Heretics and co-editor of Representing Religion in Film, her work integrates cultural anthropology with religious studies.
