

Hökūlani K. Aikau (Kanaka ʻŌiwi) is a professor and Director of the School of Indigenous Governance at the University of Victoria. Aikau is an interdisciplinary scholar with training in American Studies and Sociology and teaching experience in Political Science, Indigenous Politics, Native Hawaiian Politics, and Pacific Islands Studies. She is the author of the monograph: *A Chosen People, a Promised Land: Mormonism and Race in Hawaiʻi* (University of Minnesota Press, 2012), and co-editor of *Feminist Waves, Feminist Generational Cultures: Life Stories from Three Generations in the Academy, 1968-1998* (with Karla Erickson and Jennier L. Pierce, University of Minnesota Press, 2007), *Detours: A Decolonial Guide to Hawaiʻi* (with Vernadette V. Gonzalez, Duke University Press, 2019) and *Indigenous Resurgence in an Age of Reconciliation* (with Heidi Kiiwentinepinesiik Stark and Aimée Craft, University of Toronto Press, 2023). With Gonzalez, she co-edits the Detours Series (Duke University Press). Aikau currently serves as editor for the Pacific Islands Monograph Series, with the University of Hawaiʻi Press. Prior to coming to Victoria, she worked at the University of Utah (2017-2021), where she served as director of the Pacific Islands Studies program, and with funding from the Andrew W. Mellon foundation, created new curricular and research opportunities for Pacific Islander students. Aikau and her family visited Ləkʷəŋən territory as part of a partnership between IGOV and the Indigenous Politics program at the University of Hawaiʻi at Mānoa, where she was a faculty member (2005-2017). In 2021, she and her children moved to these territories, and they strive to be good guests on these lands and work to be right reciprocal relationship as visitors. May 2023, Aikau volunteers to complete a one-year term for a vacating member of the Senate. She is standing for nomination to continue to learn about and contribute to the good governance of UVic.
