Meeting of Senate January 10, 2020

MINUTES

A meeting of the Senate of the University of Victoria was held on January 10, 2020 at 3:30 p.m. in the Senate and Board Chambers, University Centre, Room A180.

Prof. Jamie Cassels asked Senate members to share in a moment of silence to remember the victims of the plane crash in Iran on January 8, 2020, the University of Victoria student who died, and the impact this has made across post-secondary institutions in Canada.

4. REMARKS FROM THE CHAIR

a. President's Report

Prof. Cassels welcomed new members to Senate, Dr. Peter Loock, Dean of Science, and Dr. Allana Lindgren, Acting Dean of Fine Arts. He also noted Executive changes with the Vice-President External Relations, Ms. Carmen Charette, leaving at the end of January and the new Vice-President, Mr. Chris Horbachewski, to begin February 1, 2020.

Prof. Cassels recalled his comments from the December Senate meeting and the work of the Board of Governors regarding responsible investment options under consideration for the short term investment

policy. Climate issues are at the forefront of the decision-making, and it is a hope that a decision can be made at the end of the January Board meeting.

In regards to climate change issues, Prof. Cassels mentioned investment was one element for the university to harness its capacity to contribute to climate change. He reminded members of the Strategic Framework (Strategy 5.2) to review and renew our approach to sustainability in every domain. This work would move the institution toward a comprehensive and integrated approach and that we would be taking steps to activate that campus-wide with a Climate and Sustainable Action Plan. He stated it was important to recognize the extraordinary work done to make contributions to climate solutions and the need to knit these efforts together for a more coordinated impact.

Finally, Prof. Cassels reminded members of the Presidential Service Award, which was now open for nominations. He recognized the accomplishments of Dr. Lorna Williams, who received the Office of the Order of Canada for her work in language revitalization and student Senator Rory Hills, who has accepted a Rhodes scholarship position.

Re: Proposed Examination Cancellation Policy and Guidelines

The Office of the University Secretary and the Office of the Registrar, in consultation with the Vice-President Academic and Provost, have worked to develop an examination cancellation policy for inclusion in the academic calendar (Appendix 1).

A sub-committee with the Senate Committee on Academic Standards met to develop subsequent guidelines to aid instructors when these events occur (Appendix 2).

At its meeting on November 19, 2019 the Senate Committee on Academic Standards reviewed and approved the attached Examination Cancellation Policy and Guidelines.

This memo summarizes the relevant background information, the rationale for the policy, and the research and consultation carried out. It also includes a proposed policy and adjoining guidelines for consideration by Senate.

Recommended motion:

That Senate approve the Examination Cancellation Policy and Guidelines, effective immediately, and for inclusion in the Academic Regulations - Examinations section of the Undergraduate Academic Calendar and the Faculty Academic Regulations section of the Graduate Academic Calendar.

Background and Policy Rationale

During the 2016/17 academic year, the university experienced two significant snowfall events. One of these events occurred during the final examination period. The other event, which resulted in closure of the university, occurred on a day when mid-term examinations were scheduled.

The university is aware of other risks that may disrupt operations, including other extreme weather events, earthquake, building failure (e.g. fire, flood), or communicable disease outbreak.

The Senate Emergency Protocol enables the university to respond to the academic consequences of university closure. However, the university has no policy that allows for advance planning on how to deal with examinations in the event the university closes. Having such a policy in the academic calendar would allow the university to make advance plans, and provide quick and consistent instructions to students, instructors, invigilators and staff.

As development of an examination cancellation policy began, the Office of the University Secretary conducted a scan of several other institutions' policies. Seven of these institutions had exam cancellation policies, either in their policy manual or in their academic calendar. Two institutions (Dalhousie and UBC) reschedule cancelled exams to an unused day during the exam period. Simon Fraser University adds days to the end of the exam period to reschedule exams. Simon Fraser University also allows instructors to make alternate arrangements, and for Chairs to cancel exams and substitute term grades. Other institutions leave it up to the Registrar's Office (McMaster, Saskatchewan); the course instructor (Queen's); or the Senate Executive Committee (York) to decide how to proceed.

Identification of Options for UVic

In response to the snowfall events experienced in 2016/17, the university identified a number of options for addressing cancelled final examinations, including extending the examination period, utilizing Sundays within the examination period, rescheduling examinations for the following term, or allowing instructors to use alternative evaluation methods. Consideration of these options during the policy development phase was informed by policies at other universities, review of the UVic examination schedule and academic calendar, and UVic's academic regulations. These considerations revealed that identification of a recommended option for UVic was a complex matter.

A number of factors were considered throughout the research and policy development phase. Some of the critical ones are outlined here in order to provide context for the recommended policy statement.

- Rescheduling examinations for the following term is problematic for a number of reasons, including time elapsed between course completion and sitting of the exam, conflicts with subsequent term courses, delaying previous term grades and prerequisites, lack of available exam spaces, disproportionate impact on students and faculty who must balance exams with course work, lack of capacity within the Office of the Registrar, and potential conflicts with faculty non-teaching terms and student co-op, exchange, and other off-campus term work.
- Extending the examination period has the benefits of allowing for conflict-free exam schedules, reducing disruption and disadvantage to students, and allowing exams to finish before the subsequent term begins. Disadvantages such as potential conflict with student travel arrangements and personal obligations, availability of invigilators, a shorter break between terms, potentially less time between exams, and limited capacity within the university to seat extra exams also exist. The university's capacity to extend the examination period varies each year based on existing dates for examinations and feedback has been received from the university community that any more than minimal extension of the examination period is undesirable.

Consultation

Consultations were carried out throughout the policy development phase. Both the Senate Committee on Agenda and Governance and the Senate Committee on Academic Standards provided input. The extensive consultations carried out with faculty and students during consideration of the proposal to extend Fall Reading Break were also considered. Discussions also took place with the Office of the Vice-President Academic and Provost and the university's Emergency Planning Manager. This proposal was also sent to the Faculty Association for information.

Recommendation

Following careful consideration, it was determined that providing instructors and the university with options for addressing cancelled examinations was ideal. The proposed Examination Cancellation Policy is suggested for inclusion in the undergraduate and graduate academic calendars.

APPENDIX 1

Examination Cancellation

In the event that the university closes, all examinations during the final examination period will be cancelled during the closure. If the university is open, but a safety concern (such as damage to a building or area of campus) exists that requires an immediate decision, then the Vice-President Academic and Provost may cancel the affected examinations after consulting with the Chair of Senate. Otherwise, examination cancellations will be carried out according to the Senate Emergency Protocol.

In the event that the university cancels examinations:

a) During the final examination period

The Office of the Registrar will reschedule the affected examinations to an unused day during the final exam period. If necessary, one or more days will be added to the end of the examination period.

Examinations will not normally be rescheduled to take place during the following term. Rescheduling examinations during the following term requires approval from the Vice-President Academic and Provost, and will only be considered if there is no reasonable alternative.

Students who are unable to attend a rescheduled examination should contact their instructor immediately for information and instructions.

With the approval of their department Chair, instructors may make alternate arrangements for evaluating their courses.

b) At all other times during the term

Subject to approval from their department Chair/Director, instructors will reschedule or make alternate arrangements for mid-term examinations. Students should contact their instructor for information and instructions.

Guidelines for exam cancellation may be found on the Office of the Registrar's website.

APPENDIX 2

Examination Cancellation Guidelines

Purpose

The purpose of the examination cancellation guidelines is to provide students and instructors with the procedures to follow in the event of a cancellation of exams during the final examination period.

1) Procedure for Postponing Final Examinations

The Office of the Registrar is responsible for campus-wide communication regarding exam cancellation during the final exam period but instructors should notify students of specific plans for alternate arrangements. Exam cancellation and subsequent postponement plans will be announced via the Office of the Registrar's website.

If the exam is rescheduled to the following term, the Vice President Academic and Provost will confirm approval of the postponement with the University Registrar and notify the offices of the Deans and Chairs/Directors responsible for courses affected.

The Chairs or Directors will notify the impacted faculty members. The Office of the Registrar will arrange for the rescheduled examination and the delayed release of grades. The Office of the Registrar will also advise Student Housing of any modifications to the academic schedule.

2) Procedures for Rescheduling Final Examinations within the Current Examination Period

Student Support Services within the Office of the Registrar will reschedule the examinations as follows:

- a. If an entire day of final examinations is to be rescheduled, that day will be added to a free Sunday within the exam period or the end of the examination period.
- b. If some portion of a day of final examinations is to be rescheduled, the portion of the day to be rescheduled will be added to a free Sunday within the exam period or the end of the examination period.
- c. If two or more days of final examinations are to be rescheduled, then they will be moved to the end of the examination period in the same sequence as originally scheduled.
- d. Whenever possible, rescheduled examinations will take place at the same time and location as originally scheduled -- only the day(s) will be changed.
- e. Examinations will not be scheduled on statutory holidays.

3) Student Attendance at Rescheduled Examinations

Students with scheduled travel plans should contact their course instructor for approval to make alternate exam arrangements. All other students are expected to attend their rescheduled examination(s) on the rescheduled date. Students, who received approval to not attend the rescheduled examination, will be assigned a <u>deferred grade (DEF)</u> for the course until the final grade can be submitted. Existing policies governing the approval of grades will apply.

4) Alternate Exam Arrangements

When a final examination has been rescheduled under the Examination Cancellation Policy and a course instructor determines that alternate arrangements need to be made for students with scheduled travel plans or for all students in the course, approval must be sought from the department chair/director. Instructors may choose alternate arrangements such as:

- a. a take home exam;
- b. an alternate assignment; and/or
- c. an additional exam to be scheduled for the first week of classes of the next term. This option must have the Vice-President Academic and Provost approval before plans are made for the following term.

Dates for completion must be set to ensure that marks are submitted in a timely manner. Existing policies governing DEF grades and the approval of grades will apply.

5) Cancellation of Final Exams

If alternate arrangements cannot be made and the department chair or director makes the decision to cancel the scheduled final examination(s) and not to reschedule, students will be assigned an <u>Aegrotat grade (AEG)</u> based on completed course work to date. Existing policies governing the approval of grades will apply.

Rosamund Dashwood Memorial Bursary in Dramatic Writing* (Revised – UG)

One or more bursaries are awarded to <u>undergraduate students entering third or fourth 3rd</u> year undergraduate students in the Department of Writing whose focus is dramatic writing.

Jeffrey Mallett Leadership Award* (Revised-UG)

An award is given to an <u>entering or continuing undergraduate</u> student in the Peter B. Gustavson School of Business who can demonstrate involvement in community or campus organizations. Preference will be given to a student on a Vikes Varsity team. <u>Graduating and part-time students</u> (a minimum of 6.0 units) are eligible for this award. Approval of the recipient will be made by the Senate Committee on Awards upon the recommendation of the Peter B. Gustavson School of <u>Business</u>.

Oliver Prentice Memorial - Saanich Rotary Scholarship (Revised-UG)

Re: Memorandum to Propose Discontinuing a Program

We propose discontinuing our current Bachelor of Education (Secondary Curriculum) program.

- 1. The Faculty of Education first offered a Bachelor of Education (Secondary Curriculum) in 1956.
- 2. Over the last five years, enrollment has been declining and as such, we advertised the suspension of admission in the September 2018 calendar, and accepted the last admits in September 2017. At the peak of the program in September 2011 the B.Ed (secondary) had 53 students which fell to 24 in September 2017.
- 3. According to policy AC1120, section 47.00 "Within two years of the effective date of the suspension, the Faculty must decide to either remove the suspension, or to discontinue the program"
- 4. No provisions are required for current students as admissions have not been accepted since Sept 2017. The last admits to the program are currently in their professional year (their final year), and will have completed their coursework by April 2020. An alternate pathway exists for any students wanting to teach in a secondary context in the Post-Degree Professional Program (Secondary).
- 5. We propose these calendar changes to take effect for September 1, 2020.
- 6. The School of Exercise Science and Health Education has been consulted in this change, and has been directing students to complete a BA in Recreation and Health Education, or a BSC in Kinesiology before applying to the Post-Degree Professional Program (Secondary).
- 7. We are currently working on the calendar change for cycle 2. These changes have been approved by the department and will proceed to the Faculty Council, and the Faculty Curriculum Committee for final approval.

RE: Enrolment projections

Summary

This memo recommends a level of enrolment for the coming year (2020/21), with the enrolment level subject to review throughout the year in light of changing information regarding application rates, summer session enrolments, funding levels and other factors.

For the year 2019/20, the University of Victoria was funded by the Ministry of Advanced Education, Skills and Training (AEST) to enrol **16,105 FTE** students, which included the second year of the expansion of student spaces in engineering and computer science programs and the first year of the expansion of the nurse practitioner spaces.

For 2020/21, the engineering, computer science and the JD/JID expansions will enter their third year, and the nurse practitioner expansion will enter its second year. An additional 125 FTE in engineering and computer science, 25 FTE for JD/JID, and 15 FTE for nursing are anticipated, bringing **AEST's total enrolment target for UVic to 16,270 FTE**.

Because international enrolments are not included in the AEST's target, UVic's total enrolment levels will be higher. The international enrolment plan called for 2,050 international undergraduate FTE in 2019/20. UVic achieved this level and actual enrolments are just over 2,400 FTE. As this enrolment level is expected to persist for at least three years, and Faculties and departments have been resourced to support that enrolment, UVic is assuming that this international undergraduate enrolment level will be maintained at 2,050 FTE. Therefore, **the overall enrolment recommendation for 2020/21 will be set at 18,320 FTE**. The recommended enrolment level for international undergraduates does not necessarily represent UVic's long-term desired enrolment and will be aligned with our Strategic Framework, Strategic Enrolment Management Plan and International Plan.

Background

Under the *University Act*, the Board of Governors determines the level of student enrolments upon recommendation from Senate.

The university's operating grant from the province is based on a specified enrolment expectation. The enrolment projections and the funded levels set by government are defined in terms of annualized full-time equivalent (FTE) students, which are calculated by dividing the total unit course registrations of students by the full-time unit course requirements of the program of their registration. The enrolment level is an annual target met through counting FTEs in the summer session, the winter session, and the TRU/Open Learning courses delivered by UVic. FTEs are closely related to EETs (equivalent enrolments taught), which are calculated by dividing the total unit course registrations of students by 15—this measure is used for internal enrolment monitoring purposes.

Report on 2019/20 targets

The fall interim enrolment report to AEST shows that 2019/20 funded enrolment accountabilities (which do not include international students) will all be met. UVic's projected enrolment are expected to be 105% above the overall target—16,912 FTE on a target of 16,105 FTE. UVic has exceeded both undergraduate (103%) and graduate (115%) enrolment targets set by AEST.

Growing international undergraduate population has been a strategic priority for the university, and UVic has realized that goal with a 3.8% increase in international undergraduate students this year. International students now account for 14.5% of all undergraduate and 34% of all graduate students. Overall, international students comprise 17% of the student population.

Each Faculty has undergraduate enrolment targets (EETs) and graduate enrolment targets (FTEs) for which they have been resourced. These internal, Faculty-specific targets are reviewed annually and adjustments to the targets and associated resourcing are made based on student demand and approved plans.

Under the leadership of the Provost, a Strategic Enrolment Management initiative is being implemented across the university, which will help ensure enrolment goals—including size, composition and quality—are refined and subject to continual assessment and improvement. While UVic's direction is to remain approximately the same size, strategic growth and a changing enrolment profile will occur over the next five to 10 years. Enhancing retention, and therefore student success, will continue to be a key enrolment management strategy.

From an enrolment perspective, enhancing quality will be achieved by offering competitive entrance scholarships, increasing applications and admissions of high-calibre undergraduates, and enhancing retention rates and timely graduation for all students. This will also facilitate meeting AEST's domestic undergraduate target. Internationalization will be achieved by diversifying enrolments and increasing retention rates of international students, and also by providing ongoing pathways between the Division of Continuing Studies and our academic programs as well as by increasing opportunities for international student exchange experiences.

With a substantial growth in post-secondary capacity across the province over the past decade and a declining domestic youth population, the student recruitment environment continues to be competitive. With the goal of being a university of choice, the recruitment of outstanding students from diverse backgrounds and areas continues to be a high priority. Included in that priority, and congruent with our Strategic Enrolment Management Plan, is our ongoing commitment to increase Indigenous enrolment at both the undergraduate and graduate levels.

Recommended enrolment levels for 2020/21

The list below shows expected enrolment levels for both AEST-funded enrolment accountabilities and UVic's internal enrolment expectations for 2020/21. It is proposed that a recommended enrolment level of **18,320 FTE** be approved, which includes an expansion of 125 undergraduate FTE for computer science and engineering, 25 for JD/JID and 15 for nurse practitioner student spaces. Faculty plans have been developed to accommodate at least this level of enrolment. Admission standards will vary by program, depending upon levels of student interest and demand but, as in past years, will be well above the Senate-approved standards (which are 67% for high school graduates and 60% for college transfers).

2019 Joint Board Senate Retreat Community-University Re: **Engagement Summary**

On November 25, 2019, members of Senate and the Board of Governors attended the annual Joint Senate Board Retreat. This year's theme on Community-University Engagement informed members on current campus initiatives and explored the work underway toward an institution-wide Community-University Engagement Plan.

Attached, please find the engagement summary which outlines the feedback provided by Senate and Board members during the retreat.



Engagement Summary Community-University Engagement Joint Senate and Board Retreat – November 25, 2019

Introduction

UVic is committed to working together with communities and key partners to co-create positive change. UVic's <u>Community Engagement and Partnerships Executive Committee</u> (CEPEC) has a mandate to develop and oversee the implementation of a university-wide strategy to 1) Foster strong community relations and co-create positive change through more effective interactions with communities and partners (local, regional, national and international); and to 2) Foster university-wide sharing of information and coordination of activities and decision making related to community engagement and partnerships.

Continuing to support and build on the wide range of outstanding work already underway across the university and with partners, UVic is developing a three-year Community-University Engagement (CUE) Plan. The goal of the Plan is to animate UVic's Strategic Framework and to support UVic and its partners to reach shared goals while upholding past and present experiences, relationships and knowledge in CUE. Senate and Board members were asked to provide their feedback on the work done to date and suggestions for next steps at the last Joint Senate and Board Retreat (JSBR) in November 2019. The workshop at the JSBR was an important step in the CUE Plan consultation process. The CEPEC received much valuable, diverse feedback, addressing specific questions as well as some overarching themes related to the CUE Plan and future implementation. Senate and Board members had inspiring suggestions for what UVic as an institution, and they themselves as members of the UVic community, could do to contribute to a better future for people and the planet.

Overview of the JSBR

The goal of the CUE workshop at the JSBR was to inform Senate and Board of CUE work already underway at UVic, to explore the work being done towards an institutional CUE Plan, and to collect feedback to inform the CUE Plan. In general, there was strong recognition of the work already underway and agreement for the need of a CUE Plan that would support existing initiatives while simultaneously providing an institutional focus on a few key CUE priorities. Some feedback validated our approach (such as a strong value for evaluating impact and a strong commitment to reciprocity in CUE relationships), while other feedback shed new on the work to date and encouraged us to modify us to our approach. Further, some feedback related to specific aspects of the CUE Plan as framed by our discussion questions at the JSBR, while other feedback pertained to broader overarching CUE themes such as UVic's CUE reputation, institutional CUE structures and resources, and conceptualizations of community engagement.

JSBR Feedback and Associated Decisions

CEPEC reviewed and discussed feedback received during the JSBR CUE workshop, including consideration of 1) all feedback received from consultations to date, 2) the complexities of working across disciplines, 3) <u>CEPEC's mandate</u> and 4) diverse ways of engaging with many different types of communities. Participants were generally in favour of collective impact as an approach to realize the CUE goal; however, some asked to see collective impact better explained to ensure everyone understands the application of the approach. There was much discussion around the areas for a common commitment. Several comments were shared around UVic's existing capacity, with questions around the institution's ability to address all five areas over the next three years. Discussions also focused on implementation, in particular around how initiatives would be funded and what internal structures could look like to best support and encourage faculty and staff in furthering the CUE goal.

Based on consideration of the input shared at the JSBR, CEPEC has made several changes and identified some preliminary next steps. For example, CEPEC has decided to focus on two or three areas of common commitment versus five, and to engage the community on the development of a set of shared resources to bring to bear on two or three areas of common commitment. Below is a summary of some decisions made by CEPEC based on feedback from the JSBR.

- Share updates on progress with Senate and Board (fall 2020).
