Meeting of Senate January 5, 2024

MINUTES

A meeting of the Senate of the University of Victoria was held on January 5, 2024, at 3:33 p.m. in the Senate and Board Chambers, Jamie Cassels Centre, Room A180.

Robin Hicks, Acting Chair on behalf of the President, call the meeting to order.

1. APPROVAL OF THE AGENDA

R. Hicks acknowledged an item was received after the Senate deadline from a few Senators regarding the reduction of Centre for Accessible Learning (CAL) hours of operation. He noted that on advice from the Senate Committee on Agenda and Governance, the President determined that the motion presented was outside of Senate's jurisdiction. He advised that the Provost would provide a further update on CAL and academic accommodation in her report later in the meeting.

A member of Senate asked a question as to why this extension was for 12 months as opposed to the last extension for 18 months. E. Adjin-Tettey explained that the committee agreed that a 12-month extension for IESVic would not be long enough to conduct a thorough review. Lisa Kalynchuk, Vice-President Research and Innovation, confirmed that 12 months was sufficient to conduct a review for PICS as a new director was already in place.

That Senate approve the proposal to extend the Approved Centre Status for the Pacific Institute for Climate Solutions (PICS) for twelve months from April 1, 2024, to March 31, 2025, as described in the memo dated November 20, 2023.

f. Ad-hoc Senate Committee on Academic Health Programming

i. Update from Chair

Helga Hallgrímsdóttir, Chair of the Ad-hoc Senate Committee on Academic Health Programming, provided members of Senate with an update on the ongoing work of the ad-hoc committee. Noting the work's importance, she said a request would be made to the Senate Committee on Agenda and Governance to hold a special Senate meeting in February dedicated to this issue before submitting a recommendation for Senate's approval in March.

A member of Senate asked if a unit could be approved for incorporation into a Faculty of Health by Senate even if this was not desired by the unit. H. Hallgrímsdóttir confirmed that while not the intent, it was possible and noted that Senate has a fiduciary obligation to the university to consider the health of the entire university. She acknowledged that not every department member may agree with the proposed changes. H. Hallgrímsdóttir acknowledged that the Division of Medical Sciences was concerned about their inclusion in the new faculty and advised that work was needed to help address concerns.

7. PROPOSALS AND REPORTS FROM FACULTIES

a. Faculty of Fine Arts

i. Dean's Presentation

Allana Lindgren provided members of Senate with a presentation on the Faculty of Fine Arts.

b. Faculty of Graduate Studies

i. Faculty of Graduate Studies Constitution and Bylaws

The role of Chair was temporarily passed to Elizabeth Croft, Vice-President Academic and Provost.

E. Croft introduced the proposal.

R. Hicks provided members of Senate with a presentation. He highlighted the differences between the Faculty Council and the Graduate Executive Committee and outlined the significant changes proposed to the faculty's constitution and bylaws.

In response to a question about the exclusion of teaching stream faculty from the membership during previous faculty updates, R. Hicks replied that the faculty was at the beginning stages of reviewing this matter.

Another member of Senate suggested running a parallel program approval process with the line unit and the Graduate Executive Committee to reduce time further.

<u>Motion:</u> (R. Hicks/J. Salinas)
That Senate approve the revised Constitution and Bylaws for the Faculty of Graduate Studies.

CARRIED

R. Hicks resumed the role of Chair.

8. PROPOSALS AND REPORTS FROM THE VICE-PRESIDENT ACADEMIC AND PROVOST

a. Office of the Vice-President Academic and Provost Update

E. Croft began her update by welcoming Michael Prince, Acting Dean of the Faculty of Human and Social Development.

Building on the comments made by R. Hicks at the start of the meeting, E. Croft reported that the feedback received regarding the reduction to the hours of operations in the Centre for Accessible Learning had been heard and taken seriously. She noted that since reporting to Senate in April 2023, there has been a dramatic increase in the number and complexity of exam accommodations. She acknowledged a legal and moral responsibility to accommodate students and that this was a shared responsibility between faculty and staff.

- E. Croft reported that additional one-time resources had been allocated to support accommodations during the Winter Session while a long-term strategy was developed. However, she advised Senate that a workforce shortage within the centre has resulted in an inability to service evenings and weekends. E. Croft added that disrespectful and unacceptable behaviour by colleagues has also exacerbated the issue.
- E. Croft informed Senate there was a Joint Working Group on Student Accommodation and Faculty Workload, co-chaired by the Associate Vice-President Academic Programs and the President of the Faculty

Association. This group would develop recommendations to the Provost on addressing challenges arising from increased student accommodation requests and faculty workload.

E. Croft also reported on the working group to review and renew policy AC1205, Academic Accommodation and Students with Disabilities. She noted that the Accessibility Committee has been reconstituted to help with consultation across campus.

E. Croft added that the Associate Vice-President Academic Programs intends to bring a draft Digital Learning Plan to Senate for consultation. She noted that the plan outlines the goal and strategies to help equip students, staff and faculty with the required skills for responsible and ethical engagement in digital spaces.

Regarding the mid-term pilot Senate approved last month, Senator Mark Laidlaw remarked that the Universal Design-inspired plan to offer a 1.5-time multiplier for all students may disadvantage students needing time accommodation registered through CAL. He asked how the mid-term pilot was to be evaluated. E. Adjin-Tettey responded that evaluation was being thought through and a report would be brought back to Senate with the results. She added that instructors need to determine the appropriate time required to complete an assessment to assess the necessary accommodated time within the exam schedule accurately. She acknowledged there would be bumps, but there was no desire to disadvantage CAL students.

A member of Senate expressed concern about being misled on the mid-term pilot. His observation was that three faculties were to be given special treatment regarding their participation in the pilot. At the same time, the rest of the campus received notification regarding the reduction of hours for CAL right before the winter closure. E. Croft reiterated this was an issue of the available workforce. E. Adjin-Tettey noted the current pilot was not intended to be a permanent solution, and special treatment was not to be provided to the participating faculties. She added that participating classes were those with large enrolments and that their centrally scheduled midterm was the only assessment that would be supported.

A student member of Senate expressed concern that this may particularly affect marginalized students who must take evening and weekend classes due to other commitments. E. Adjin-Tettey noted this was considered; however, because this was a matter of available workforce, there was a desire to provide students with certainty at the start of their term. She hoped that instructors and students would work together to make alternate arrangements.

There being no other business, the meeting was adjourned at 5:14 p.m.

Summary of the proposed change:

The School of Nursing is proposing a change to admission to their graduate program Master of Nursing to accommodate the new Indigenous Wellness stream going forward to Senate for approval December 1, 2023.

The MN Indigenous Wellness stream is intended for Indigenous Nurses who wish to pursue graduate studies. Students who identify as First Nations, Inuit or Métis ancestry in Canada are given priority admission. Indigenous Nurses from countries outside of Canada will also be considered.

Rationale: While Schools of Nursing have responded to recommendations of the Truth and Reconciliation recommendations (CASN, 2021), Schools of Nursing do not currently offer graduate education reflective of Indigenous knowledge and practices related to health and wellness. As a result of this gap, there are nationally recognized inequities impacting Indigenous nurses in Canada. The proposed stream will address the inequities in access to nursing education as reported by Canadian Association of Schools of Nursing (CASN, 2021) including:

- A decrease in the number of Indigenous students in both admissions (17.9%) and graduates (2.7%) of a Master Nursing program over the last two years in Canada.
- Only 2.2 % of Indigenous nursing faculty hold a permanent Faculty position, and 1.5% hold a full-time faculty contract, and <1% of Indigenous faculty hold part-time contracts.

Therefore, the newly developed stream and preferential admission of Indigenous students will ensure a pathway to graduate education for Indigenous nurses.

The proposed admission change has been approved at the School of Nursing, and the Faculty of Human and Social Development.

Proposed Tracked Changes:

Admission requirements

Admission requirements

Initial enquiries regarding graduate programs should be addressed to the Graduate Adviser, School of Nursing. Application materials may be obtained from the Graduate Admissions and Records Office website and the School of Nursing website.

Applicants for the degree of MN in Nursing must meet all general requirements of the Faculty of Graduate Studies, as well as the specific requirements of the School of Nursing. The equivalent of a minimum of two years' full-time recent nursing practice as a registered nurse, preferably in the chosen area of concentration, is strongly recommended.

Applicants to the <u>Double Degree option in Nursing and Health Informatics</u> must meet admission criteria for both programs. Application guidelines and links to the Faculty of Graduate Studies application form are available on the School of Nursing and School of Health Information Science websites.

Completed applications and supporting documents must be available for consideration by the School and faculty on, or prior to, the published deadline dates.

Admission is highly competitive. Not all students who meet the minimum requirements will be admitted. These programs are offered as resources permit.

Admission To Master's programs

Applicants for admission must have completed a Baccalaureate in Nursing (equivalent to the degree offered by the University of Victoria) with at least a B+ (77%) average for the last two years of university work. Please note that practica, non-graded (pass/fail) courses, credit granted on the basis of life or work experience, or credit earned at institutions not recognized by the University will not be used in determining an applicant's admission grade point average or units completed. Any courses used in the calculation of the entering average cannot be used toward a graduate degree program. The Faculty of Graduate Studies may, therefore, be required to take nursing diploma or post-secondary grades outside of the Bachelor of Science in Nursing degree into account when calculating application grade point averages in order to calculate on 30 units.

The Master of Nursing program admits students on an annual basis for September entry, with limited enrolment.

Prior to admission, all applicants to the School of Nursing Masters of Nursing Graduate

Programs must provide evidence of completion of an upper level (300 or 400) undergraduate

statistics course at a recognized post-secondary educational institute with a final grade of B or above and must provide evidence of completion of a recognized, interactive Indigenous cultural safety course for health providers (e.g., PHSA San'yas Indigenous Cultural Safety Training – Core Health). These courses must have been completed within five years of application.

Applicants for admission to the Nurse Practitioner and the Nurse Practitioner Post-Degree Stream programs must reside in British Columbia and maintain active practicing registration with the BCCNM for the duration of the MN-NP program and MN-NP Post-Degree Stream program.

MN Nurse Practitioner Post-degree Stream requirements include: Completion of a Master of Nursing (equivalent to the degree offered by the University of Victoria) with at least a B+ (6.0) average for the MN degree) within the past 10 years.

Applicants for admission to the MN Indigenous Wellness graduate program must be Registered Nurses who self-identify as First Nations, Metis, and Inuit students. Admission will be offered to First Nations, Inuit, and Metis students from communities in BC, those born in Canada, followed by international Indigenous students.

All students admitted to MN distance programs are required to attend an onsite orientation to their program in August, prior to program commencement in September. For Nurse Practitioner and MN Post-Degree Stream Nurse Practitioner students, this onsite orientation is in addition to the required onsite components that occur in term two to six in the NP program and MN-NP Post Degree Stream program.

Students must provide official verification of active practising registration as a Registered Nurse (or the equivalent in the jurisdiction[s] in which the student is taking the program). Active practising registration must be maintained for the duration of the program.

The UVic School of Nursing holds the view that nursing is an academic discipline and a practice profession. The Canadian Association of Schools of Nursing (CASN) sets the standard for programs of nursing education in Canada. In order to ensure that applicants have the preparation to be successful at the graduate level prior to consideration for full admission, graduates from programs not accredited by the Canadian Association of Schools of Nursing (CASN) may be required to take a limited number of graduate level nursing courses as unclassified non-degree students, achieving a grade of B or above in each. These courses may be accepted for transfer credit in the MN program if the student is subsequently accepted.

Applicants must meet all of the admission requirements of the Faculty of Graduate Studies. In addition, applicants must submit a professional curriculum vitae with complete work, education, and training; academic and employer references; and, a letter of intent related to the program. Students whose first language is not English require an acceptable score on an approved English language competency test (see English Language Proficiency). Nurse Practitioner and Nurse Practitioner Post-Degree Stream applicants will be shortlisted and contacted for a face-to-face or telephone interview.

Applicants admitted to the MN program must provide evidence of successful completion of a basic life support level C course completed no more than 12 months prior to admission. A valid CPR level C certificate must be maintained for the duration of the program.

Applicants admitted to all MN programs must complete an HSPnet form for use and disclosure of student information for practicum purposes.

All students entering a graduate program in Nursing must have access to the Internet, email and Microsoft Office (i.e. Word and PowerPoint) as well as Adobe Reader or Adobe Acrobat for the duration of the program.

Synchronous learning sessions (booked online classes in real time) may be required for all MN program options. Students enrolled in the MN Nurse Practitioner option and the MN Nurse Practitioner Post-degree Stream are required to be available for weekly online synchronous learning opportunities.

At present, admission to the program occurs via declaration, using the Faculty of Social Sciences: Requirements, following the completion of their first year.

Current Faculty of Social Sciences Requirements for declaration:

Submit a Request to Declare Program (RDP) to the Academic Advising Centre after completion of 12.0 units.

The <u>proposed</u> admission requirements will add the following:

Students who wish to be admitted to the Bachelor of Science Psychology and Computer Science Major should apply in writing to the Undergraduate Adviser of the Psychology Department on completion of their first year (completion of 12.0 units). The Undergraduate Adviser will accept applications from April 1 until the program is full for entry in the following Fall term.

A student will be admitted only if there is space in the program and the following conditions are met, except in cases where extenuating circumstances are concerned:

Declaration

- Complete a minimum of 12 units of courses required for this program, including:
 - CSC110 Fundamentals of Programming I (1.5)
 - o CSC115 Fundamentals of Programming II (1.5)
 - MATH122 Logic and Foundations (1.5)
 - PSYC100A Introductory Psychology I (1.5)
 - o PSYC100B Introductory Psychology II (1.5)
- Earned a minimum grade of C in all courses taken from the following subject codes: CSC, SENG, MATH, STAT, ENSH, ENGL, ATWP, ECE, ENGR, or PSYC

This proposal brings the program's admission and graduation requirements into consistency with the requirements for participating in the Computer Science major program, which are:

All students admitted into the Computer Science program must declare into either a Major or Honours degree program once they have successfully completed, at a minimum, CSC 115 (or CSC 116) and MATH 122. Required Computer Science, Software Engineering, Math, Statistics and English courses completed with a grade below a C must be repeated with a grade of C or better prior to graduation.

This proposed admission change ensures that students do not declare into the program until they have successfully completed the entry level courses in the program and they meet a minimum grade standard, indicating they will be prepared to be successful. Also, this is consistent with declaration in the Computer Science Major program.

At present, the numbers of students entering into the Computer Science and related programs at UVic are growing, supported by expansion funding in BC's Future Ready Skills plan. As the student numbers reach the target size, it will be important to ensure that the number of students in the programs is matched to the resources available in the Computer Science department. In consultation with departments hosting combined Computer Science programs, the Computer Science department will track the available space in the programs, the number of students seeking declaration and inform the partner department, in this case, the Department of Psychology, how many students can be declared each year.

The Undergraduate Adviser in Psychology would determine which students are being admitted to the program. The Undergraduate Adviser would notify the students, and copy both the Academic Advising Centre (AAC) and the Academic Adviser in CSC. Students would then submit their Request to Declare Program through the DeclareMe online portal and only students on the list provided by the Psychology Undergraduate Adviser would be declared by academic advisers in the AAC.

Statistics and English courses completed with a grade below a C must be repeated with a grade of C or better prior to graduation.

This proposed admission change ensures that students do not declare into the program until they have successfully completed the entry level courses in the program and they meet a minimum grade standard before they are declared into the program, indicating they will be prepared to be successful. Also, this is consistent with declaration in the Computer Science Major program.

At present, the numbers of students entering into the Computer Science and related programs at UVic are growing, supported by expansion funding in BC's Future Ready Skills plan. As the student numbers reach the target size, it will be important to ensure that the number of students in the programs are matched to the resources available in the Computer Science department. In consultation with departments hosting combined Computer Science programs, the Computer Science department will track the available space in the programs, the number of students seeking declaration and inform the partner department, in this case, the Department of Geography how many students can be declared each year.

The Undergraduate Adviser in Geography would determine which students they are being admitted to the program. The Undergraduate Adviser would notify the students, and copy the Academic Advising Centre (AAC) and the Academic Adviser in CSC. Students would then submit their Request to Declare Program through the DeclareMe online portal and only students on the list provided by the Geography Undergraduate Adviser would be declared by academic advisers in the AAC.

Admissions to the Secondary Post-Degree program in a Science teaching area (Biology, Chemistry, Physics, General Science), has for some time included a pre-requisite requirement of a course on 'History or philosophy of science, medicine or technology'. This requirement has proved to be a significant barrier for prospective students applying for program entry, and has resulted in students being denied entry or not being approved to qualify for a science teaching area as they were missing this one entry requirement. This course requirement is unique to UVic, and removing it will bring the UVic requirements more in line with other teacher education programs across the province.

There are no implications from a professional certification point of view, as this course is surplus to the teacher certification course requirements from the Ministry of Education.

Implementation Plan:

Education Advising is already waiving this requirement for students applying for September 2024 entry.

Support:

This change has been passed by the Department of Curriculum and Instruction, the Faculty Council and the Undergraduate Curriculum Committee. Education Advising is also in support of this change.

The Department of Biology wishes to clarify the requirements for the B.Sc. (Honours) program in response to a request from the Academic Advising Center. These changes mainly have the purpose of assisting the AAC in determining a student's eligibility for a B.Sc. Honours degree, but also will help students who might be confused on a couple of issues.

The changes are:

- 1. The 6.0 GPA rule for acceptance into the Honours program is currently being treated by Honours Advisors as a firm requirement, so the "should" will be strengthened to "must'. However, we have not been enforcing the rule through the students' programs that this GPA be maintained. The note about both BIOL and MRNE was added because not everyone realizes that MRNE courses count as Biology courses, but they do. Note that the 6.0 GPA applies to admission to the Honours program; the 5.5 GPA in the next sentence refers to a degree completion requirement.
- Clarification of the Department's standards (which have been in effect for many years)
 in the program description. Clarification of a situation that rarely arises, but that
 has come up once in our institutional memory: a student who fulfills all the
 requirements for an Honours degree, except for the requirement for a grade of
 80% better in BIOL499B, will receive a Major degree.
- 3. Addition of a statement for the students' benefit to inform them of a rule that the Honours Advisors have been observing.

We look forward to the opportunity to present the proposed changes to SCAS for approval.

A change tracked version of the Kuali submission follows.

Program requirements

Program requirements

Honours students complete the program of required courses shown below and the Biology electives as described for the Major, and in addition take <u>BIOL 460</u> (0) and <u>BIOL 499A</u> and <u>499B</u> (3.0) in their fourth year. Of the remaining 9 units to complete the 60 unit degree requirement, at least 3 units must be from an additional course(s) in Biology chosen in consultation with the department.

Any prospective Honours students should first discuss proposed thesis research with a faculty member and obtain the member's consent to serve as thesis supervisor. The student should then apply to the departmental Honours Adviser for admission to the Honours Program before May 1 in the third year of studies. However, applications will be accepted up to the end of fall registration in the fourth year of studies. The completed thesis will be examined by a small committee including the supervisor. Applicants should must have and maintain a GPA of at least 6.0 inacross all department courses. (both BIOL and MRNE courses).

A student who obtains completes the program with a minimum GPA of 5.5 or better across all department courses, and a minimum grade of A- (80%) in BIOL 499A and 499B, will receive an Honours in Biology. A student who completes the program with a GPA of less than 5.5 across all department courses will receive a Major in Biology, regardless of the grade obtained in BIOL 499A and 499B. The submission student date who for completes the the thesis program is with the ea last grade day of lectures B+ (79%) or lower in BIOL 499A and 499B will receive a Major in Biology.

The submission date for the thesis is the last day of lectures.

Subject: Removal of internal GPA requirement, BFA Major program in Theatre

The current proposal is in reference to the following requirement as mentioned in the current Calendar: "With the exception of the Self-Directed Focus, students must normally have a cumulative average of 6.0 (B+) in Theatre courses to be admitted and advanced."

The department of Theatre currently offers seven Focus areas within its BFA program with a Major in Theatre: Theatre History, Applied Theatre, Self-Directed, Directing, Performance, Production and Management, and Design.

The Department has completed a thorough and extensive review of its undergraduate curriculum. The relevant proposals have been approved by the Senate Committee on Planning (December 6, 2023) and by the Senate Committee on Curriculum (December 8, 2023); the changes (Cycle 1) are to be effective in the May 2024 UVic Undergraduate Calendar.

The approved changes for May 2024 involve the reduction of the Focus areas to four. This is to be achieved through:

- The discontinuation of three areas: Theatre History, Applied Theatre, Directing
- The discontinuation of the Self-Directed area and its substitution by a new Performance area
- The renaming of the existing Performance area to Acting
- The revision of the requirements of two areas: Production and Management, Design

As a result, the revised program will comprise the following Focus areas: Acting, Performance (using a more comprehensive definition of 'performance' than currently in usage), Production and Management, and Design.

The revised program includes a removal of the GPA requirement from the Focus areas. This is due to two reasons: first, to treat all Focus areas through the same academic standard by providing consistency across the Focus areas and therefore the entire Major program which leads to a BFA degree; second, to eliminate barriers for some of our students to accessing the program. Extensive discussion in the department of Theatre has shown that the GPA requirement is less appropriate for its Major program and more so for its Honours program (see below). The current requirement may penalize students who excel in experiential pedagogy but who have not yet had the full benefit of the range of instruction offered at different levels within their degree and program.



The department will still be responsible for supporting a student's progression through the Major program; this is ensured by the requirement to audition and/or interview to gain entry into the Focus areas in the third year (an entry that notes "An interview or audition is required to enter each of the focus areas, normally in April at the end of Year 2." will be added to Theatre's Program Requirements section of the general calendar entry (BFA-THFM). This requirement will be repeated under the program requirements for each focus as well). The audition or interview is to support the students as they enter into the various focus areas and provide an opportunity to for the student and instructors from the relevant focus to discuss the student's progress. This will create a smoother transition for all into the Focus areas. The current program only required an audition to get into the Performance Focus; this led to uneven expectations. The change in interview/audition requirements is not subject to SCAS approval since it is not competitive and is meant to support the students in their choices but will have a positive impact to the student experience in combination with the removal of the GPA requirement. In all, the removal of the GPA requirement from the revised program ensures consistency in opportunity within the program while providing a customized, high-quality experience irrespective of the Focus area a student chooses.

The current SCAS proposal does not affect the requirements of the Theatre Honours program in Theatre History.

We request that the Department of Theatre's proposed removal of its internal GPA requirement be placed on the January agenda of SCAS so that the Department may implement its full range of curriculum revisions in May 2024. The curriculum proposal which includes the proposed change is BFA-THFM.

Re: Aegrotat (AEG) Grade Notation

At previous meetings, the Senate Committee on Academic Standards identified the need to develop a standardized definition and procedure for the University's Aegrotat (AEG) grade notation. This memo summarizes the relevant background information and the rationale for a standardized policy and provides options for the committee to work toward a transcript definition for the university.

Recommended Motion:

That Senate approve the revisions to the definition of the Aegrotat Grade Notation in the Undergraduate Academic Calendar in May 2014 undergraduate academic calendar.

Background and Rationale

At the October 2020 meeting of Senate, the <u>Examination Cancellation Policy and Guidelines</u> were approved. In preparation for this work, the Senate Committee on Academic Standards completed an analysis of the exam scheduling capacity and the existing procedures to guide students and the campus community in the event of an unexpected cancellation of exams during the final examination period.

One identified constraint was the challenge of rescheduling examinations at the start of the following term. Rescheduled exams in the next term can create repercussions regarding pre-requisite course requirements, conflicting course schedules, co-op or practicum commitments, and graduation plans.

Cancellation of final exams

If alternate arrangements cannot be made and the department chair or director makes the decision to cancel the scheduled final examination(s) and not to reschedule, students will be assigned an Aegrotat grade (AEG) based on completed course work to date. Existing policies governing the approval of grades will apply.

An identified issue is the current understanding of the AEG grade notation. The definition is broad and does not explain how the grade may be calculated or interpreted. As a result, students receive varying grade calculations when provided with this option and practice is not consistent across the campus.

Peer Institutional Surveys

During the development of the Cancellation of Final Examination Policy and Guidelines and research toward an understanding different definitions of the AEG notation, two surveys were conducted across a variety of institutions regarding how the term is defined and calculated. Both institutional surveys found that most post-secondary institutions define AEG as a concession provided to students with medical and other extenuating circumstances preventing the completion of a course. These definitions remove the grade from the student's transcript. Accordingly, the University of Victoria's revision to the Undergraduate Academic Concessions regulation provides an opportunity for a student to Withdraw Under Extenuating Circumstances (WE) due to medical and other extenuating circumstances.

In addition, both surveys found that many post-secondary institutions note a minimum of the course is to be completed before an AEG is assigned and the course is deemed complete. This is also similar to the UVic academic concession of the WE. The University of Victoria's current AEG grade notation does not change the normal calculation of a student's GPA and does not require a minimum degree of the course to be completed. Rather, the AEG is a grade notation that is placed alongside the student's calculated grade and course credit is granted if the course is passed.

Undergraduate Academic Concessions

Previously, the regulation in the undergraduate academic calendar stated that an Academic Concession could consist of the following (in addition to a Deferral, Extended Deferral, Withdrawn for Extenuating Circumstance, or a Backdated Drop):

an Aegrotat (AEG) notation added to a course grade in cases where injury, affliction, or illness affected performance in a completed course, or will prevent completion of a course, and a Deferral is not viable;

The new <u>Academic Concession Guidelines</u> define the AEG grade notation as accompanying a final grade, assigned where valid grounds for a request for academic concession affected the student's performance or prevented completion of all course work.

One major issue for the AEG grade notation at UVic is inconsistent grade calculation across faculties. In some cases, the grade may be calculated as the coursework completed up until the disruption for the student, with no adjustment for outstanding work missed. In other cases, the grade may be pro-rated with the graded work applied to the calculation over the possible course components submitted/graded, minus any missed work.

The new undergraduate Academic Concessions regulation assigns authority to the Associate Dean, Academic (as designated by the Dean) to decide whether an Aegrotat (AEG) grade notation is appropriate for a student. This development has changed from the Chair/Director as the decision-maker and narrowed the number of individuals in the calculation and assignment of the AEG grade notation.

Between May and August 2023, the University Secretary's Office consulted the Academic Associate Dean of each Faculty. Through these discussions, it was learned that the application of an AEG grade notation by an Associate Dean is rare. When the AEG is used, it is typically offered to a student who is not eligible for a Withdrawn for Extenuating Circumstances (WE) due to the completion of the course requirements.

Committee Discussion

At the September SCAS committee meeting, members discussed the need for consistency in the calculation of the student's grade when an AEG grade notation is assigned. In addition, the committee understood the desire to address ways to pro-rate a student's academic work to enable flexible assessment in situations where an Academic Concession may not be applicable. As a result, the committee examined the ways in which this may take place.

Concerns were raised that if the required components of a course were not clearly articulated, inconsistent negotiated conversations may lead to unintended consequences regarding bias and favouring only students who felt empowered to speak up when in difficulty. Also considered was that in allowing an AEG pro-rated grade calculation in addition to an AEG notation would compensate a student twice; once as a transcript notation to explain the circumstance and second to recalculate the grade. As a result, an AEG notation should be meant for students who completed the required components of a course and, due to extenuating circumstances as outlined in the Undergraduate Academic Concessions regulation, are not able to complete the course entirely.

Recommendation

The University of Victoria is currently unclear on the way in which the university utilizes and calculates the Aegrotat grades notation (AEG). As various other universities also use this term in a variety of ways, it is important to ensure there is clarity for students who are submitting their transcripts to other universities or agencies for assessment.

In addition, while the process for assigning an AEG grade notation is now decided among a smaller group of decision-makers due to the revisions to the Academic Concessions Guidelines, the ways in which this process is embarked may still vary depending on the Associate Dean for each faculty. As a result, a common understanding and process will ensure consistency and transparency is maintained for students across the university.

While other universities consider AEG grade notations to explain extenuating circumstances and assign PASS/FAIL grades, the University of Victoria undergraduate Academic Concessions regulation covers many of the circumstances in Appendix A and B using the Withdrawn for Extenuating Circumstances (WE) grade.

In discussion with the committee, the following revised definition is proposed to cover the current use of the AEG grade notation at the University of Victoria:

Appendix 1

Scholarships, medals and prizes

Scholarships, medals and prizes are awarded to students primarily on the basis of academic merit. Other additional eligibility criteria, as specified in the terms of reference, will be considered when selecting recipients. Scholarships, medals and prizes for undergraduate students are administered by Student Awards and Financial Aid (SAFA). Detailed information about the terms of reference and application process (if applicable) for undergraduate scholarships, medals and prizes is available on the SAFA website.

Awards

UVic also offers non-repayable funding referred to as awards. Recipients are selected on the basis of the eligibility criteria specified in the terms of reference for each award. Eligibility criteria may include, but are not limited to, a minimum academic achievement, financial need, identifying with a group with historical and/or current barriers to equity, program of study or participation in a varsity sport.

Recipients of athletic awards are selected on the basis of the eligibility criteria specified in the terms of reference for the award and the requirements stipulated by U SPORTS; an organization external to UVic that establishes the funding rules for student athletes in varsity sport at participating universities in Canada. Entering student athletes must have a minimum admission average of 80% to receive an athletic award in their first year of post-secondary study.

Returning student athletes must have passed a minimum of 9.0 units for credit, with a minimum sessional GPA of 3.0, in the preceding academic year. The total combined value of athletic awards cannot exceed the student's assessed tuition and mandatory fees for the academic year in which they receive the funding.

Bursaries

Bursaries are non-repayable financial assistance awarded on the basis of financial need and satisfactory academic standing. There may be additional selection criteria specified in the terms of reference, but financial need is the primary selection criteria.

Robyn Kathleen Addison Scholarship in Environmental Studies (Revised)

One or more scholarships are awarded to undergraduate women students entering or continuing in the School of Environmental Studies who have demonstrated financial need.

Alec Maclean Award in Economics (Revised)

One or more awards are given to <u>entering</u> <u>transferring</u> or continuing undergraduate students in the Department of Economics with demonstrated financial need. Approval of the recipients is made by the Senate Committee on Awards upon the recommendation of the Department of Economics.

TANSI Bursary Award (Revised)

One or more <u>awards are given</u> bursaries are awarded to undergraduate or graduate Métis students with demonstrated financial need.

Maple Reinders Scholarship (New)

A scholarship is awarded to an academically outstanding undergraduate student continuing in either the Civil Engineering or Mechanical Engineering program in the Faculty of Engineering and Computer Science.

First preference is for students with an interest in construction management or project management.

Second preference is for students who are members of groups with historical and/or current barriers to equity, including, but not limited to:

- First Nations, Métis and Inuit peoples and all other Indigenous peoples;
- members of groups that commonly experience discrimination due to race, ancestry, colour, religion and/or spiritual beliefs or place of origin.
- persons with visible and/or invisible (physical and/or mental) disabilities;
- persons who identify as women; and
- persons of marginalized sexual orientations, gender identities and gender expressions.

Approval of the recipient will be made by the Senate Committee on Awards upon the recommendation of the Faculty of Engineering and Computer Science.

Carolyn E. & Robert J. McCormick Indigenous Graduate Scholarship (New)

One scholarship of at least \$12,500 is awarded to a Canadian-born Indigenous graduate student in the Faculty of Law. Approval of the recipient will be made by the Faculty of Graduate Studies Graduate Awards Committee upon the recommendation of the Faculty of Law.

Peninsula Co-op Dr. Ian MacPherson Memorial Scholarship* (Revised)

One or more scholarships are awarded to academically outstanding graduate students participating in a co-op work program. Preference will be given to a member or the child of a

member of the Peninsula <u>Co-op.</u> Consumer Services Cooperative. Applications can be found on the Faculty of Graduate Studies website and must be submitted by July 31 to the Faculty of Graduate Studies. Approval of the recipient(s) will be made by the Faculty of Graduate Studies Graduate Awards Committee.

Chaney Award* (Revised)

One or more awards are given to entering continuing or transferring undergraduate or graduate students in the Department of Chemistry. Preference is given to students with demonstrated financial need.

Marilyn McCrimmon Scholarship in Education* (Revised)

A scholarship is awarded to a Masters student enrolled in the second year of Counselling Psychology, Educational Psychology, or Leadership Studies in the Faculty of Education. Preference will be given to:

- students with financial need
- students enrolled in an internship or co-op.

Part-time students (minimum 1.5 units) are eligible for this award. Approval of the recipient will be made by the Faculty of Graduate Studies Graduate Awards Committee upon the recommendation of the <u>Department of Educational Psychology and Leadership Studies</u> Faculty of Education.

Gustavson School of Business Emergency Bursary (New)

One or more bursaries, to a maximum of \$500 each, are awarded to undergraduate or graduate students in the Peter B Gustavson School of Business. The bursary is intended to offer students financial assistance in the event of an unforeseen emergency or circumstance while attending the University of Victoria. International students are eligible for this emergency bursary.

Dr. Charlotte Loppie Award (Revised)

One or more awards are given to Indigenous undergraduate students in the School of Public Health and Social Policy who demonstrate financial need, with preference given to mature (23 years or older) Indigenous women. Part-time students (registered in a minimum of 6.0 units for credit in two terms) are eligible. Approval of the recipient(s) is made by the Senate Committee on Awards upon the recommendation of the School of Public Health and Social Policy.

Joyce Green and James Johnson Scholarship (New)

One or more scholarships are awarded to:

- Indigenous graduate students who are Canadian citizens, or
- Non-Indigenous graduate students who are Canadian citizens and who demonstrate significant Indigenous allyship (defined below).

Eligible applicants will be pursuing studies and research with an emphasis on any of the following subjects: Indigenous politics, law or theory; feminist, anti-colonial, critical race or ecological and environmental matters.

All applicants must submit:

• a description (max 500 words) of their research demonstrating which subject area it falls under, and

• a letter from their supervisor confirming that the research relates to the applicant's thesis topic.

Non-Indigenous applicants must also submit a description (maximum 500 words) demonstrating their Indigenous allyship.

First preference will be given to Indigenous students who are single custodial parents; second preference is for Indigenous students who demonstrate financial need. Students apply via the online graduate scholarship application between July 1st and September 15th. Approval of the recipients will be made by the Faculty of Graduate Studies upon the recommendation of departments.

Allyship is understood to be a verifiable durable demonstration over a significant period of time, of knowledge of, commitment to and solidarity with Indigenous people or to a cause or movement initiated by and for Indigenous people. It must be more than a mere profession of solidarity: it must be demonstrated with actions.

Harris & Co Black Legal Scholar Award (New)

One award of \$2,500 will be given to an undergraduate student entering the Faculty of Law who self-identifies as Black. Preference will be given to a student who has demonstrated academic ability together with determination, resilience, contribution, and compassion in areas of life such as prior work experience, graduate study, community service, family care or disability. Approval of the recipient will be made by the Senate Committee on Awards upon the recommendation of the Faculty of Law.

Harris & Co Diversity Entrance Award (New)

One award of \$2,500 will be given to an undergraduate student entering the Faculty of Law who self-identifies as Black, Indigenous or a Person of Colour. Preference will be given to a student who has demonstrated academic ability together with determination, resilience, contribution, and compassion in areas of life such as prior work experience, graduate study, community service, family care or disability. Approval of the recipients will be made by the Senate Committee on Awards upon the recommendation of the Faculty of Law.

Juliana Polstein Memorial Award (New)

One or more awards are given to entering or continuing undergraduate students in the School of Nursing who demonstrate financial need. First preference is for mature students (23 year and older) and second preference is for single parents. Students in nursing registered in at least 4.5 units per term are eligible for this award.

Approval of the recipients is made by the Senate Committee on Awards upon the recommendation of the School of Nursing.

Alexander, Holburn, Beaudin and Lang Scholarship (Revised)

A scholarship of \$1,000 is awarded to a student completing the second year of the LL.B JD program who has achieved high academic standing and who has demonstrated the qualities required for the practice of law. Approval of the recipients will be made by the Senate Committee on Awards upon the recommendation of the Faculty of Law.

Carfra Lawton LLP Scholarship (Revised)

An award of \$1,000 is given to a continuing or graduating undergraduate student in the <u>Faculty of Law</u> who has completed course work in Insurance Law or Civil Procedure and demonstrates an aptitude for or interest in practicing law in either of those areas. Approval of

the recipient will be made by the Senate Committee on Awards upon the recommendation of the Faculty of Law.

Cook Roberts Scholarship in Civil Procedure (Revised)

A scholarship of \$500 or such higher value as the donor may determine is <u>awarded to a continuing or graduating undergraduate student in the Faculty of Law</u> who has achieved high academic standing in the Civil Procedure course and who has participated substantially in extra-curricular activities. Approval of the recipient will be made by the Senate Committee on Awards upon the recommendation of the Faculty of Law.

Cook Roberts Scholarship in Business Associations (Revised)

A scholarship of \$500 or such higher value as the donor may determine is <u>awarded to a continuing or graduating undergraduate student in the Faculty of Law</u> who has achieved high academic standing in the Business Associations course and who has participated substantially in extra-curricular activities in the Faculty of Law. Approval of the recipient will be made by the Senate Committee on Awards upon the recommendation of the Faculty of Law.

Gowling WLG (Canada) LLP Prize in Intellectual Property & Technology Law (Revised)

An award is made to a student in intellectual property and/or technology law courses. Approval of the recipient will be made by the Senate Committee on Awards upon the recommendation of the Faculty of Law. This prize may be awarded to a graduating student.

Harper Grey Insurance Law Prize (Revised)

A prize of \$500, or such higher value as the donor may determine, is awarded to a <u>continuing</u> <u>or graduating undergraduate</u> student in the Faculty of Law who has demonstrated excellence in the Insurance Law course. Approval of the recipient will be made by the Senate Committee on Awards upon the recommendation of the Faculty of Law.

J.S.D. Tory Prize for Advocacy (Revised)

The law firm of Tory, Tory, DesLauriers and Binnington has established the J.S.D. Tory Prize for Advocacy. The prize, in an amount not less than \$1,000 is awarded to the student, who in the opinion of the Faculty, is the most outstanding student in the Advocacy program at the Faculty of Law. In determining the recipient of the award, the Faculty shall have regard to the student's performance in the Legal Mooting Course, the Advocacy course, the Clinical Legal Education program, and in inter-scholastic mooting competitions. Re: Proposal for changes to the BSN University of Victoria and College

Partners program in the School of Nursing Program

At its meeting on January 10, 2024, the Senate Committee on Planning considered the proposal for changes to the BSN University of Victoria and College Partners program in the School of Nursing.

The University of Victoria and Colleges Partnership is a unique collaboration wherein the University of Victoria is the degree granting partner. The last comprehensive curriculum review for the University and College Partners occurred in 2007, suggesting the need for change to address shifting healthcare needs.

The proposal alters the sequencing of the course offerings to enable a more appropriate introduction to the basis of nursing inquiry as well as research principles. Students will have earlier access to knowledge that serves in a more fundamental way, and promote evidence informed, research intensive teaching and clinical reasoning and decision-making expectations for practice responsibilities. These changes facilitate current and forward-thinking nursing education that will better prepare students for practice in a rapidly changing and advancing health care system.

The following motion is recommended:

Motion: That Senate approve, and recommend to the Board of Governors that it also approve, the proposed changes to the BSN University of Victoria and College Partners program in the School of Nursing, as described in the document "BSN University of Victoria and College Partners Program".

A. Provide a summary of the proposed change. Clearly articulate the rationale for the change. How does the proposed change align with unit/faculty/UVic institutional plans and priorities?

The University of Victoria and College Partners is a unique collaboration wherein the University of Victoria is the degree granting partner. Three of the college partners (Aurora College, College of the Rockies, Selkirk College) offer all 4 years of the program at their sites, but students in those settings officially become UVic students in Semester 6 and continue with that designation until graduation. Camosun College in Victoria offers the first 5 semesters at the Interurban site, and students physically transfer to the University of Victoria in Semester 6. All sites share a common BSN curriculum, a Curriculum and Evaluation Committee with representatives from all five partners, and well-developed and established frameworks for communication and collaboration within the context of this shared curriculum. The curriculum has recently received 7-year accreditation through the Canadian Schools of Nursing (2020) and 7-year program recognition and approval through the British Columbia College of Nurses and Midwives.

The last comprehensive curriculum refresh for UVic and College Partners occurred in 2007 suggesting the need for change as a way addressing shifting healthcare needs. The Canadian Association of Schools of Nursing (CASN) is aware that a curriculum renewal is underway. Nurses' regulatory body, the British Columbia College of Nurses and Midwives (BCCNM) are also aware of our proposals and approve of our plans for a renewed curriculum (Appendix 10). We wish to alter the sequencing of the course offerings to enable a more appropriate introduction to the underpinnings of nursing inquiry, as well as research principles, so that students have access to knowledge that serves in a more foundational way, and promote evidence informed, research intensive teaching. We also propose the creation of a course in Semester 7 wherein students focus on clinical reasoning and decision-making, consolidating bio-medical knowledge with advancing expectations for practice responsibilities. Importantly, we propose that we eliminate two practice courses (Nursing Practice 1 in Semester 1 and Consolidated Practice IV [N470] at the end of Year 3). This proposal re-allocates the loss of 4.5 units to accommodate for the loss of N470.

The current proposal, founded on key pedagogical priorities, also aligns with the Senate Committee on Academic Standards' recommendation to re-examine the program design, while fulfilling the UVIC 30-unit residency requirement. Placing a greater emphasis on leadership skills and community practice in the Leadership Practice course is consistent with current expectations for graduates. The new course, Clinical Reasoning, using a problem-based format, will place a necessary emphasis on honing clinical judgment for senior students, integrating and consolidating scientific knowledge that has been lacking in the later part of the program. Recognizing increasing complexities as well as the ubiquity of clinical judgment, we also prepare nursing graduates for the new licencing exam that assigns a greater weight on critical thinking, reasoning, and decision-making skills. The proposed changes to eliminate NP 1 and N470 will reduce stress and fatigue at two critical points when workload is heaviest, improving the student learning experience. We believe that the proposed changes facilitate current and forward-thinking education for practice in a rapidly evolving health care system. The new course weightings also reflect expectations for practice education to meet high acuity needs and specialty foci in both acute care and community settings.

The proposed revisions align with the inclusive values that underly the UVic Strategic Plan, the School of Nursing (SoN) Strategic Plan, and the Indigenous Plan. The proposed changes align with the inclusive principles and attention to partnerships outlined in the University of Victoria Strategic Plan, which will be key to our future processes. The attention to planetary health put forward in the Indigenous plan resonates with priorities of human health dimensions of climate change and Eco literacy as a priority in program course delivery. The University of Victoria School of Nursing (SoN) mission statement as articulated in our strategic plan states that the SoN "prepares nurses to lead, disrupt, and engage for healthy and equitable communities." The statement guides our plans for renewal.

Does the proposed change require additional resources (faculty/staff appointments, space, library) beyond the unit's current complement? If yes, please provide details.

The proposed revision to the curriculum will mean a reduction in the number of faculty required to teach in the program Nursing Practice I (Semester 1) and N470 (the end of Year 3). It will reduce the reliance on sessional instructors to teach these practice courses. All partner sites are prepared to teach the Research and Inquiry courses earlier in the program and have the faculty expertise to do so.

B. Does the proposed change have an impact on admission requirements? If so, please provide details.

C. Impact on Students – does the proposed change have an impact on students (student evaluation, student progression, supervision, etc. You should address transition between the current program and proposed change, if applicable).

There are no changes, in principle, from current practices having to do with evaluation, progression, supervision etc. Current students will continue with the existing program until graduation. Students entering the University of Victoria with the revised curriculum will not undertake the university portion of the program (Semesters 6-8) until January 2027. This will mean that students who withdraw from the program temporarily will need individual learning plans to ensure they graduate with the courses that align with the year of entry. Plans are underway at all partner institutions to address these exigencies.

D. Does the proposed change involve changes to the curriculum? If yes, include a draft of the proposed curriculum changes and clearly indicate how it differs from the existing curriculum.

See Appendix 3 (Comparison Chart of Current and Proposed Changes). The changes that are unique to the University of Victoria part of the program (Semesters 6-8) are italicized for clarity below, where the proposed changes are outlined.

- 1. **Eliminate Nursing Practice 1 in Semester I** to lighten an unreasonable academic load during the first semester of the program.
- 2. **Move Inquiry (NURS 341) and Research Course (NURS 360) to earlier in Curriculum** (Inquiry to Semester 2I and Research to Semester 4). These courses currently exist in Semester 6. No additional human resources will be required to accommodate this proposal.
- 3. **Expand the length of time for Consolidated Practice Course at the end of Year 3** (CPE 3; NURS 370) from six weeks to eight weeks and add 1.5 units, making it a 6-unit course. No additional human resources will be required to accommodate this proposal.
- 4. **Eliminate N470 (the second consolidated practice course) at the end of Year** 3 and re-weight the existing courses in Semester 6-8 to accommodate for the loss of 4.5 units.
- 5. Condense Relational Practice courses from three courses to two courses (Year One and Year Three). These courses already exist, but by collating and prioritizing the learning from these courses, we can eliminate one course in this stream, making room for one of two courses to be moved from the UVic portion of the program to earlier in the program, where the learning from these courses can be positioned in a more foundational way.

- 6. **Move the Ethics course (PP3) from Semester 4 to Semester 3** to allow a place for the Research course in Semester 4. No additional human resources will be required to accommodate this proposal.
- 7. **Develop a Course for Semester VII to highlight nurses' knowledge and decision-making responsibility** in the context of pharmacology, nurse prescribing, symptom management, and nutrition education. This proposed change would satisfy needs to 1) address and partially fulfill the 30-unit UVic residency requirement, given the proposal to eliminate N470, and the loss of 3 units associated with that change (the other 1.5 units will be attached to the Semester 7 Leadership Practice course, as described below). The value of this course will be 3.0 units, reflecting the depth and rigour of expectations to fulfill the stated learning outcomes.
- 8. Increase the number of units attached to Nursing Practice in Semester Six from 1.5 units to 3.0 units (College Partners only). Students will participate in additional practice hours and with higher expectations associated with that increase in practice hours. This proposed change would satisfy needs to 1) address and fulfill the 30-unit UVic residency requirement, given the proposal to eliminate N470, and the loss of 4.5 units associated with that change.
- 9. **Increase the number of units allocated for Semester 7 Leadership Practice** (N456 at UVic, N431 among Partners) from 1.5 units to 3.0 units. This proposed change will add extra practice hours to enrich students' learning around leadership as they prepare for graduation.
- 10. Change the designation of the "Compulsory Elective" Indigenous courses (2 courses at Camosun/UVic, and one course at each of the other College Partner sites) to reflect core foundational learning wherein students learn about local Indigenous knowledge, history, and practices, among other specific objectives that will ultimately inform nursing practice. The centrality of this learning is therefore respectfully represented as essential, site-specific knowledge.
- 11. Reduce the required number of non-nursing electives from 3 courses to 2 courses to reflect the change in designation of "compulsory elective" for the Indigenous courses, which formerly made up, in part, the requirement for 3 non-nursing electives. Please note that in Semester 7 there remains a "Nursing Elective" course, which is distinct from the required "Non-nursing elective" that is discussed above. That course features nursing topics, taught by nursing faculty, and all students must choose one that is offered in Semester 7.
 - E. Does the proposed change affect the current program learning outcomes? If yes, identify the revised program learning outcomes.

YES.

The first 5 Program Learning Outcomes of the BSN program have been reworded to reflect currency, but the meaning associated with each one remains unchanged from the current articulation. An additional program learning outcome has been added, (#6, which articulates the commitment to reconciliation and anti-racist outcomes for students graduating from this program). The revised learning outcomes are below.

At completion of the curriculum, graduates will:

- 1. Promote health and well-being by providing quality nursing care across a variety of contexts and with diverse populations.
- 2. Be accountable and ethical Registered Nurses who provide care and make decisions based on relationships with others, nursing knowledge and other forms of inquiry.
- Demonstrate leadership that influences Registered Nursing practice and health care at professional,

- social, environmental, economic, and political levels by anticipating and responding to the changing needs of society.
- 4. Engage in intentional critical inquiry and self-reflection to facilitate life-long learning.
- 5. Contribute Registered Nursing knowledge and voice to interprofessional and team-based collaborations to optimize health outcomes and strengthen health services and systems.
- 6. Be shaped by understanding of the historical and current social realities that result in anti-Indigenous racism, and which negatively impact Indigenous health and well-being. This curriculum is committed to enacting the principles of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission (TRC) and the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples (UNDRIP).
- F. Does the proposed change affect opportunities for experiential learning opportunities, including co-op, community engaged and research-enriched learning, integration of Indigenous perspectives, decolonization, equity, diversity, inclusion, global perspectives, etc. If yes, please provide details.

YES

Students in the BSN program have opportunities for experiential learning opportunities through the varietal practice experiences throughout the program. At the Selkirk/College of the Rockies sites, international field experiences to Guatemala and Uganda take place for Years 3 and 4 students as placement in Consolidated Practice courses.

The University of Victoria and College Partners BSN program employs both partner-wide and site-specific approaches for advocacy in the context of anti-racism, inclusivity, diversity, and equity, but active integration of Indigenous perspectives. Examples include the additional program outcome, and the addition of Indigenous Knowledge into the foundational approaches. We also incorporate these references within revised concept model for the concept-based curriculum (Appendix 4), and the revised Decision Making for Nursing Practice model (Appendix 5), among other numerous references in the guide.

Opportunities for community engaged and research-enriched learning:

BSN programs in British Columbia and the Northwest Territories incorporate significant experiential practice learning opportunities across a diverse range of settings, including community and hospital-based settings. Each site currently has practice placement teams who develop and organize practicum placements for students that align with corresponding theoretical approaches to practice that are emphasized in the appropriate semester.

The Nurse Educators who serve in the University of Victoria and College Partners BSN program are highly qualified registered nurses. Nurse Educators at all sites participate in scholarship (this is an accreditation expectation from the Canadian Association of Schools of Nursing), which is supported in several ways by the University and College Partners collaboration. The areas of research among faculty are varied, but all center on furthering nursing and practice excellence and contribute to the discipline of nursing and nursing education in salient ways. Examples of areas of research for UVic faculty include the following: maternal-child health, mental health and substance use, immigrant and refugee health, informatics, and seniors' health.

- At UVic, exceptional students are regularly supported by faculty to participate in the Jamie Cassels Undergraduate Research Awards (JCURA) to enhance opportunities for nursing research.
- At Partner sites, initiatives to foster research include an annual student-led research conference, which is presented virtually and available to students and faculty across the partnership. These conferences provide opportunities for faculty and students across the partnership to learn from each other and share research enterprises.

G. Does the proposed change align or distinguish the program from comparable programs at other BC post-secondary institutions? If yes, please provide details.

There is both alignment and distinction in our BSN programming, The proposal aligns with other BSN programs, for example, by offering research earlier in the program. Although the University of Victoria and College Partner BSN program has always been known for a commitment to social justice, the current proposal deepens those distinctions.

Because we are a regulated program, and routinely accredited by our regulatory body, the British Columbia College of Nurses and Midwives (BCCNM), some degree of alignment with other BSN programs is required at the University of Victoria School of Nursing. Our accreditation with the Canadian Association of Schools of Nursing assures us of quality and consistency in content and delivery models of curriculum compared with other universities and colleges throughout Canada.

The proposed changes will make the program course load manageable for students and contribute to student wellbeing, retention and success and improved graduation rates.

Part II: Overview/Summary						

In Spring, 2018, the Steering Committee of the University of Victoria and College Partners BSN program (UVic and College Partners) determined that a curriculum revision was appropriate. The implication for students engaged in BSN education inspires a greater sense of currency for nursing education in the context of identified content and pedagogical priorities throughout all 8 semesters of the program. We acknowledge the colonial history of nursing, and nurses' contributions to the atrocities associated with residential schooling. We currently highlight this history for students in many contexts throughout the program, and the curriculum refresh has positioned this content more formally, with references occurring in course blueprints and the Curriculum Guide, among other locations. The University of Victoria embraces the centrality of anti-racist and de-colonizing approaches to teaching and learning and inclusivity for all students and peoples, including 2SLGBTQIA+ individuals and groups. Our refreshed curriculum (shared among UVic and 4 college partners) puts these ideas at the center of teaching and learning, and identifies deepened focus on ecoliteracy and planetary health, mental health and substance use – all pressing issues of our times, and which will require significant knowledge and skill application among registered nurses. We see this work, indeed, as Nursing's unique alignment with UVic's Indigenous plan, "Helping to Move Us Forward," as we strive to help students to move forward in

their goals to become registered nurses, who will in turn help others to move forward in their lives, within and through nurses' unique disciplinary contexts of caring.

Rationale for the proposal (approximately 200 words).

Nursing is a dynamic profession, with ongoing responsibilities to maintain disciplinary currency. The need is great to graduate nurses who are skilled, knowledgeable, and equipped to participate in strong allyship and action for equity seeking individuals and groups.

The last comprehensive curriculum refresh for UVic and College Partners occurred in 2007, and further accreditation with the Canadian Association of Schools of Nursing (CASN) and our regulatory body, the British Columbia College of Nurses and Midwives (BCCNM) is contingent on work for fulfilling the plans for the current refresh. In operational terms, we also propose to alter some of the sequencing of the course offerings to enable a more appropriate introduction to the underpinnings of nursing inquiry, as well as research principles, so that students have access to these learnings at an earlier stage of the program, when the knowledge can serve them in a more foundational way. These ideas are consistent with BSN nursing programs across the country. We also propose the creation of a course in Semester 7 wherein students focus on clinical reasoning and decision-making, consolidating bio-medical knowledge with advancing expectations for practice responsibilities. Together, the impact of these changes on students will be to ensure they receive a current and forward-thinking education that will prepare them for practice in a rapidly changing and advancing health care system. For each of these proposed changes, the centrality of Indigenous interests are reflected formally in the revised Curriculum Guide and course blueprints. Importantly, the profile of equity-based, anti-racist, and decolonizing approaches in nursing is integral to our quest for change and renewal, and must be lived out in the classroom and in nursing practice.

For program revisions or discontinuances, how many Indigenous students are currently enrolled?

At present, approximately 70 self-identifying Indigenous students across four years of the program across the partnership are enrolled. We continue to work towards systems wherein students will feel safe to self-identify, and recognise this as a current and ongoing need for safety, in order to serve the needs of Indigenous students more fully. The UVic BSN program (Camosun College intakes UVic students) reserves 12% of the 160 available seats for qualified Indigenous students.

	Within the Indigenous Plan (University of Victoria, 2023) UVic's Guiding statement reflects key principles for creating the culture to which the university aspires. Indigenous Laws and Philosophies offer valuable foundational approaches for moving forward in the world. The sacred cycle illustrates a profound truth about the circuitous dynamic between teacher and student- an image that has the potential to remind us of the reason for our presence as educators at the university.

In our refreshed curriculum, we propose that Perspectives on Indigenous Knowledge is situated as one of the foundational approaches, and resonates with the challenge of being "prepared for the work to come." This section of the refreshed Curriculum Guide, (authored by an Indigenous faculty member Leanne Poitras Kelly), for example, states:

Acknowledging the history and current efforts of western institutions and academia in subtle acts of subjugation, is a crucial quest to position IK on equal footing, and elevate the discourse within nursing curriculum (p. 54).

A "good heart and mind" guide commitment for decolonizing, anti-racist BSN education in our proposal. To that end, that priority is reflected throughout the revised Curriculum Guide. For example, the revised course blueprints build learning outcomes that integrate Indigenous-specific needs as they relate to the learning in the course.

The weft of "People Learning and Teaching Research and Re-searching" is explored in the pedagogy section of the revised Curriculum Guide, where educators consider Indigenous students' needs in the classroom and in nursing practice, and foster inclusiveness with specific teaching strategies. Another identified priority, the attention to climate-related health, aligns with the UVic Indigenous Plan, as well as the UVic Strat plan, which emphasizes the centrality of relationship to the lands and waters. Within that, there are opportunities to acknowledge and learn from the ongoing stewardship afforded by Indigenous peoples, historically and to this day.

When considering the context of the curriculum refresh proposal for UVic and College Partners BSN, the possibilities for advancing institutional priorities and plans resonate. The above examples constitute some of the many possible supports to the UVic Indigenous and Strategic Plans that comprise the curre nt proposal. The work is, and will continue to be, carried out by the framework for BSN programming for UVic and College Partners, which includes the Partners Curriculum and Evaluation Committee, Uvic and College Partners Steering Committee (which reviews the commitment to decolonizing approaches on a regular basis), the Directors of each of the college partners' Schools of Nursing [or equivalent title] and designated faculty reflective of each site's context, to promote the important decolonizing and inclusive work.

The British Columbia College of Nurses and Midwives (BCCNM) Education Program Review Committee (EPRC) Panel met to consider the Substantial Change – Curriculum Change Notice of Intent (NOI) submitted on March 22, 2022, by University of Victoria (UVIC) with Camosun College, College of the Rockies (COTR), and Selkirk College, for the collaborative Baccalaureate Registered Nurse Program. The Panel requires no additional information for the NOI. A summary of the proposed changes highlighted in the NOI are listed below:

- Addition of program-level outcome on addressing anti-Indigenous racism, enacting principles of TRC and UNDRIP
- Updated foundational perspectives and conceptual framework
- Deletion of practice course in Semester 1
- Shift of Nursing Research and Nursing Inquiry courses earlier in the program
- Development of one new course:
 - Semester 6: Health Sciences V: Pharmacotherapeutics and Nutrition The Scholarship of Clinical Reasoning and Knowledge Translation for Practice
- Reconfiguring of Year 3 summer consolidated practice education courses from 12 weeks to 8 weeks
- All course content will be updated for currency, language, and context, including decolonizing, anti-racist, and gender-inclusive approaches to nursing education and practice

The Panel recommended BCCNM accept the NOI for curriculum change with no change to the current recognition status or review schedule.

TERMS OF REFERENCE

The Senate of the University of Victoria recognizes and honours individuals for their outstanding achievements by awarding them honorary degrees. Such degrees are presented at Convocation. Orators play a vital role in recognizing and celebrating the recipients. They research, write and deliver citations that articulate for both a general and an academic audience, the reasons why the honorary degree is being granted.

The University maintains a roster of orators, appointed by the Senate, that includes a University Orator, a Deputy University Orator and other orators.

I University Orator

The University Orator will:

- 1. research and write citations for honorary graduands and read those citations at Convocation;
- 2. provide instruction and advice to other orators;
- 3. assign orators to work on particular citations;
- 4. edit draft citations; and
- 5. assist in the recruitment and orientation of new orators.

II Deputy University Orator

The Deputy University Orator will:

- 1. research and write citations for honorary graduands and read those citations at Convocation; and
- 2. act for the University Orator when he or she is absent.

III Orators

The Orators will:

1. research and write citations for honorary graduands and read their citations at Convocation.

PROCEDURES

- 1. The University Orator, Deputy University Orator and other Orators will be appointed by the Senate upon the recommendation of the President. The Chair and Vice-Chair of the Convocation Committee will advise the President on such appointments.
- 2. The Chair and Vice-Chair of the Convocation Committee will seek to appoint as orators members of the university community who:
 - are excellent public speakers;
 - are able to shape biographical materials into a portrait which explains the achievements and qualities of the recipient of the honorary degree (ie: not a mere c.v.);
 - are available at the times of Convocation (spring, fall); and
 - enjoy seeing students convocate and participating in Convocation.
- 3. The term of appointment will normally be three years, renewable, from July 1 to June 30.

NOTES

- 1. Service as an orator is deemed to be service to the university under the Framework Agreement (Joint Committee on the Administration of the Framework Agreement Annual Report 2006).
- 2. An individual who has not yet been appointed as an orator by the Senate may be invited by the University Orator to prepare and deliver a citation.
