Dr George Tzanetakis is a Professor of Computer Science (also cross- appointed in Music and Electrical and Computer Engineering) at the University of Victoria. He received his PhD degree in Computer Science from Princeton University in May 2002 and was a Postdoctoral Fellow at Carnegie Mellon University working on query-by-humming systems with Prof. Dannenberg and on video retrieval with the Informedia group. His interdisciplinary research deals with all stages of audio content analysis such as feature extraction, segmentation, classification with specific focus on Music Information Retrieval (MIR). His pioneering work on musical genre classification is frequently cited and received an IEEE Signal Processing Society Young Author Award in 2004. He was Canada Research Chair (Tier II) in the Computer Analysis of Audio and Music from 2010- 2020 and received the Craigdarroch research award in artistic expression at the University of Victoria in 2012. He has presented tutorials on MIR and audio feature extraction at several international conferences. He is also an active musician and has studied saxophone performance, music theory and composition.
